

WHAT'S HAPPENING

Welcome to all as we come together. We are glad you have chosen to come to the Transitional Cathedral today. God bless you and your family and friends.

The Cathedral Choir is currently on holiday and will return this Wednesday 30 January 2019. Thank you to **The Cathedral Singers** who are supporting our Sunday Worship.

Next week is Candlemas, the celebration of **The Presentation of Jesus in the Temple**. People attending the 10am service of Choral Eucharist will be invited to gather outside the Cathedral prior to the service as we make a procession into the Cathedral. The Cathedral Crib scene remains *in situ* until after Candlemas, the final possible celebration of the extended Christmas Season.

Dear Friends, welcome to the Transitional Cathedral, the broad tent with a wide open door! Welcome to those visiting us from near and far, to all who gather from around the Diocese and to those who worship here Sunday by Sunday.

Today the gospel text puts before us the inaugural preaching of Jesus, his opening sermon to the people of God as he begins his ministry. The author of the gospel, St Luke, is telling us that this is a programmatic prophecy which Jesus uses to both announce who he is and what kind of Messiah he will be. Everything else about Jesus is to be understood in the light of this sermon.

What we hear is that he will exercise a prophetic voice. He is anointed by the Spirit of God to announce Good News, and he will fulfil what was said by Isaiah about the 'servant of the Lord'. A few verses later in this passage, Jesus also gives himself the title of 'prophet' and appropriates to himself the examples of the prophets Elijah and Elisha (Luke 4:24-25).

We hear that Jesus will be Good News to those who are poor, blind, in captivity, oppressed. In Luke's gospel, this character of Jesus' ministry does not refer to life in the next world when we are received by God into heaven or some other spiritual reality. This Good News is expressed in terms of political or economic reform so that these are concrete realities that can be experienced now, if only we will listen to God and be better at working for justice and peace.

Furthermore, as Luke is unfolding the story, it will become clear that this Good News is for everyone, not just an exclusive group of disciples, or those on the inside. God's visitation, God's care for the poor and the oppressed extends to nations, and not just Jesus' own tribe and nation. As Simeon foretold in the temple when Jesus was presented as a newborn infant, Jesus will be "a light for revelation to the Gentiles (which means all people beyond Jesus' own nation) and for glory to your people Israel."

There are still tickets available for the ordination of The Rev'd Peter Carrell to be Bishop of Christchurch, which will take place on Saturday 9 February. Do come along. Please register with Nicky Lee to get your ticket.
